From the CMD's Desk

To Esteemed Shareholders,

On behalf of the Board of Directors of HSCC, it gives me immense pleasure to welcome all of you at this 33rd Annual General Meeting of your Company. I take this opportunity to extend sincere thanks to you for joining us today and your unstinted support, provided to the Company during the year.

Review of Performance

As you would have seen in the Annual Report, during F.Y. 2015-16 we set new records with strong top line and bottom line growth and high quality earnings, reflecting the robustness of its Corporate Strategy of creating fast growth drivers. This performance is particularly remarkable when viewed against the backdrop of the extremely challenging business context in which it was achieved, namely, a slowdown in the economy and high levels of inflation.

I am glad to report that your Company has posted impressive performance for the year ended on 31st March 2016.

The Company recorded the highest ever Total Income, Consultancy Fees, Profit before Tax, Profit after Tax and Reserve & Surplus.

I am pleased to place before the shareholders that during Financial Year 2015-16, the Total Income achieved at Rs. 1106.98 Crore as compared to Rs. 575.77 Crore in the previous year, posting 92.26% growth. The Company earned Consultancy Fees of Rs. 97.98 Crore as compared to 42.28 Crore for previous year resulting 131.28% growth, which is higher than average service sector growth in India.

The Company posted pre-tax profit of Rs. 87.98 Crore as against Rs. 37.95 Crore during previous year. Thus company achieved 131.83% growth in pre-tax profits for the year 2015-16. The Company earned

Net Profit of Rs.54.62 Crore as compared to 24.54 Crore earned in previous year posting 122.58% growth.

I am pleased to inform you that Company has recommended 683% dividend on paid up capital amounting to Rs. 16.38 Crore out of Current year's profit for the year 2015-16. This is the 32th consecutive year the company declared the dividend. Upon paying this year's dividend, cumulative dividend paid to Government of India would be Rs. 56.90 Crore around 24 times of current paid up equity capital of the Company.

Performance of Healthcare Sector

Future of Healthcare sector especially the hospital in India is very bright in comparison with the global trend. India is lagging much behind in terms of requirement of infrastructure for building, equipment, manpower and their training, which are also the areas to address for the company.

The beds available in India per 1000 patients are approximately 0.9 against developed countries where per 1000 beds ratio is approximately 3 to 4. The increase in beds in India will lead to increase in overall infrastructure, including buildings, equipment and manpower.

The per capita expenditure on manpower of government on healthcare is also increasing wherein out of pocket expenditure has to reduce like other developed countries and thereby resulting into major addition to infrastructure On-going Projects.

The Company secured highest ever work for providing consultancy services for Design & Engineering, Project and Procurement Management for various prestigious & challenging projects during the reported year from the MOH&FW, its institutes, State Governments and some of them on against open bidding.

HSCC is an executing agency for Construction of 3 New AIIMS at Guntur, Kalyani & Nagpur with aggregate Project value of Rs. 4949 Crore.

During the year the HSCC achieved the status of its Mini Ratna-I status from December 2015 onwards.

Top Management is striving to achieve sustained growth in turnover as well as in pre-tax profits continually through strategic interventions like cost-control, optimum utilization of resources and system improvements. The Company has achieved "Very Good" Rating under the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for the year 2014-15 signed with the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare as per guidelines of Department of Public Enterprises (DPE), Government of India. Further, based on results, for the year 2015-16, the Company expects to get "Excellent" rating as per MOU evaluation.

Corporate Social Responsibility

The Company being in the field of Health Care, all its activities and operations are indirectly dedicated towards the social responsibility.

In F.Y. 2015-16, HSCC contributed Rs. 60 Lakh for 10 Cochlear Implant to Hearing Impaired Children with special needs through M/s Artificial Limb Manufacturing Corporation of India. (A Government of India Undertaking under Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment). HSCC made contribution of Rs. 49.24 Lakh to "Clean Ganga Fund" for river development and rejuvenation of River Ganges. HSCC also contributed Rs. 5 Lakh for construction of charitable dispensary building at Ramakrishna Math, Kolkata.

Change in Accounting Policies

In 2015-16, HSCC brought change in its accounting policies. Revenue recognition is done for all Civil Projects i.e. recognition of value of work done and contract expenses in Profit & Loss Account of the company. Interest income on FDRs of client is recognized as Revenue of the company and interest paid to clients by crediting their accounts is shown in Expenditure side of Profit & Loss Account.

The matter in line agreed by Internal Auditors, Statutory auditors and CAG (Comptroller and Auditor General) for change in above accounting policy for revenue recognition for all projects.

Your Company has also been exploring business opportunities abroad through Ministry of External Affairs in the SAARC group of countries.

The company has an order book of more than Rs. 18000 Cr. healthcare infrastructure projects (throughout the country and abroad). HSCC's net worth is Rs. 174 Cr.; Its performance over the past few years has been excellent. It has been rated as one of the fastest growing PSUs by renowned rating agencies.

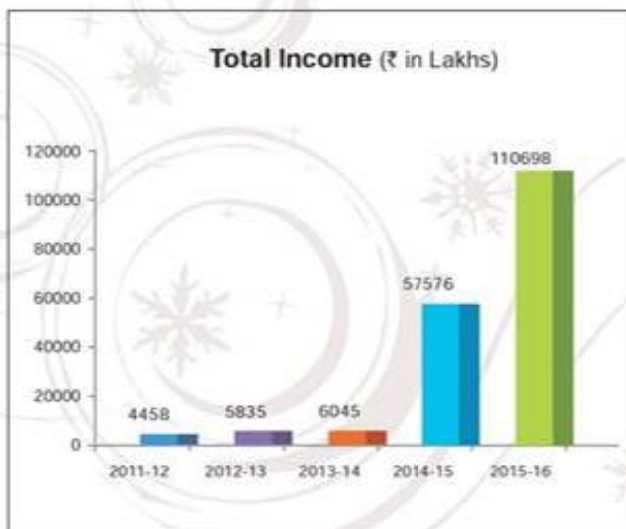

SSB Block in Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Medical College & Hospital, Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh

The foundation Stone for Super Specialty Block in Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Medical College, Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh was laid by Shri Jagat Prasad Nadda, the Hon'ble Minister for Health and Family Welfare on 05th November 2016. The project is under Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY) which envisages setting up of new AIIMS and up-gradation of existing Government Medical Colleges. Shri Gyanesh Pandey, CMD, HSCC briefed the Hon'ble Minister about the upcoming blocks. The ceremony was also graced by Shri Faggan Singh Kulastre, Hon'ble Minister of State, Health & Family Welfare, Govt. of India; Shri Shivraj Singh Chouhan, Hon'ble Chief Minister of Madhya Pradesh; Shri Sharad Jain, Hon'ble Minister for Medical Education, Govt. of MP; Shri Rustam Singh, Hon'ble Minister of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of MP along with other dignitaries.

With a view to correct the imbalances in availability of affordable & reliable tertiary-level healthcare in the country in general, and, to augment facilities for equality medical education in under-served or backward areas, in particular, up-gradation of 39 Government Medical Colleges or Institutions are being undertaken under the PMSSY Phase-III programme. Of these, 19 are being taken up by HSCC as the project Management & Supervision Consultant. This project is one of these.

The facilities proposed are as per the Gap Analysis Reports, distributed over the two blocks, and include:

- Block A – OPD, Paediatrics Surgery ward, CTVS ward, Neurology ward, ICUs, 3 Operation Theatres + Cath lab
- Block B: Dialysis, Diagnostics, Urology ward, Labs, Neurosurgery, Cardiology wards, ICUs, 2 OTs

The construction is to be spread over an area of 15,987 Sqm; bed strength of 266 would be added (including 62 ICU beds & 12 Dialysis beds).

The proposed facilities shall be implemented within a period of 26 months.

Goods and Service Tax Act

Proposal of Goods and Service Tax is an effort of Government to have a simplified one tax system in the country. This will help to bring all type of sales and services under one common umbrella for taxation purpose. In the fast growing economy and diversified system, it is very difficult to survive with the multiple and complex system of taxation. Over 130 countries had adopted the GST model in one or other way. In Asia country like Australia, New Zealand and Singapore are already using GST Model.

Likewise India has also entered in one of the biggest tax reform Named as "GOODS AND SERVICE TAX." (GST)

1. INTRODUCTION

GST is a destination based tax on goods and services with value addition at each stage. In the continuous channel of production and distribution, set off benefit is available and the tax is imposed on final consumption within the taxing jurisdiction.

GST may be defined as a tax on Goods and Services which is leviable at each point of sale or provision of service, in which at the time of sale of goods or providing the services the seller or service provider may claim the input credit of tax which he has paid while purchasing the goods or procuring the service.

GST is a Value Added Tax (VAT) on both goods and services, as against the prevailing VAT only on goods and Service Tax only on Services.

The basics of GST may be elaborated through the proposed salient features of the GST model given by Empowered Committee:

- GST to have two component: one levied by the Centre (Central GST), and the other levied by the States (State GST) with rates for Central GST and State GST to be prescribed appropriately reflecting revenue consideration and acceptability. GST model to be implemented through multiple statues (one for CGST and SGST statue for every state) but with uniform basic features of law such as chargeability, definition of taxable event and taxable person, measure of levy including valuation provisions, basis of classifications etc.
- Both Central GST and State GST to be leviable on all transactions of goods and services made for a consideration except goods and services, which are outside the purview of GST and transaction which are below the prescribed threshold limits.
- Central GST and State GST to be paid to the accounts of the Centre and the States Separately and consequential non-availability of cross-utilisation of input tax credit ie. taxes paid against the Central GST only and State GST to be permitted only in the case of inter-state supply of goods and services under a newly conceived Inter-State GST (IGST) model.
- Uniform procedures for collection of Central GST and State GST would respective legislation with responsibility of administering Central GST with the Centre and for State GST with the States.

The basis of taxability would be same for both CGST and GST. Empowered Committee (EC) of State finance Ministers opined that SGST as well as CGST for goods should have two rate structure:

Lower rate – for necessary items and goods of basic importance;

Standard rate – for other goods in general.

Further they advised one tax rate for GST and CGST for services. There will also be a special rate for precious metals. The rates are yet to be finalized. For example GST rates in few countries are as under:

At present India is working on complex multiple type of taxation having cascading effect of "Tax on Tax." Industries are facing complications where multiple taxations involved like in construction industry having impact of Works Contract Tax and Service Tax.

After implementation of GST various Indirect taxes will be foregone. GST will sum summed all the Central and State taxes.

Unlike the other countries where GST is a centralized tax, in India it will be leviable by both central and state governments as per the proposal. As such both the structure and administration of the levy will have to emerge after detailed negotiations and bargaining between states and union territories with legislatures.

The Centre and states had broadly agreed on the structure of the tax and administrative system and the mechanism for relieving taxes on inter- state transactions. It was commonly agreed on exemption list, levying of tax at two rates and keeping petroleum products out of GST regime. It has also been agreed that the tax levied at the stage of inter-state sale was to be collected and pooled separately and transferred to the destination state through clearing house.

1.1 Origin of GST in India.

In the context of implementation of Fiscal Responsibility and Budget Management (FRBM) Act, 2003, the Kelkar task force had suggested a comprehensive Goods and Service Tax (GST) based on VAT principle.

The effort to introduce the new tax regime was reflected for the first time in 2006-07 in Union Budget Speech. The then Finance Minister Mr. P. Chidambaram remarked that there is a large consensus that the country must move towards a national level GST that must be shared between the Centre and States.

Subsequently the Empowered Committee of State Finance Ministers agreed to work with the Central Government to prepare a road map for introducing a national level GST with effect from 1st April 2010. In may 2007 Empowered Committee (EC) of State Finance Ministers in consultation with the Central Government, constituted a Joint Working Group (JWG) to recommend the GST Model. JWG presented its report on the GST to EC in November 2007.

The first Discussion paper on Goods and Service Tax in India by the Empowered Committee of State Finance Ministers was released on November 10, 2009.

The Constitution Amendment Bill for Goods and Services Tax (GST) has been approved by The President of India after it was passed in the Parliament (Rajya Sabha on 3 August 2016 and Lok Sabha on 8 August 2016) and ratification by more than 50 percent of state legislatures. The Government of India is committed to replace all the indirect taxes levied on goods and services by the Centre and States and implement GST by April 2017.

With the implementation of GST:

- It is anticipated that the tax base will be comprehensive and all goods and services will be taxable, with minimum exemptions.
- It will reduce the cascading effect of tax on the cost of goods and services. It will impact the tax structure, tax incidence, tax computation, tax payment, compliance, credit utilization and reporting, leading to a complete overhaul of the current indirect tax system.
- It will have a far-reaching impact on almost all the aspects of the business operations.
- It would bring in significant change in doing business in India.

NOTE :Article is to give basics information related to implementation of Goods and Service Tax in India. Wherever required the data are taken from available websites.

Can Liquidated Damages' and Risk and Costs Claimed Concurrently

This article attempts to address a common issue which arises in disputes arising from breach of commercial contracts executed by and between the Employer and the Contractor. In this era of rapid growth and development, timely execution of commercial contracts is of utmost importance. However, in course of performance of contracts, breaches by one party to the prejudice of the other party are also inevitable. Such breach calls for financial compensation to the affected/ aggrieved party for loss or injury by the party in breach in the nature of "damages". Generally speaking, in case of breach of contract, a sum is awarded to restore the affected party to the economic position the parties expected to be in upon due and proper execution/ performance of the contract. However, it is not practically possible or viable to award damages in such manner and apply it as a straitjacket formula irrespective of the provisions of the contract.

The affected party may claim damages with a view to restore itself to the economic position it occupied at the time of execution of the contract or to prevent the party in breach from being unjustly enriched. Apart from the above standard terms of contract, parties while executing modern day contracts agree for predetermined measure of damages in the form of "liquidated damages" to be paid upon breach of the contract by one of the parties. Usually, liquidated damages are quantified and limited to stipulated percentage of the contract value.

However, merely because the parties agree to a maximum ceiling limit for claiming liquidated damages, that by itself does not preclude the parties from claiming or recovering damages on other accounts, if otherwise the contract provides for the same and the actual damages suffered is much more.

It is a common understanding that in a contract that provides for payment of liquidated damages for its breach, the party complaining of the breach can recover from the party in breach only a reasonable compensation not exceeding the amount of the liquidated damages that has been agreed upon. The judgments of the Supreme Court, namely *Fateh Chand vs. Bal Kishan Das*, ((1964) 1 SCR 515), *Kailash Nath Associates vs. Delhi Development Authority*, (2015) 4 SCC 136 and *ONGC vs. Saw Pipes*, 2003 (5) SCC 705, are wrongly relied upon to support the aforesaid myth.

However, each of the aforesaid judgments, lays down the law only with respect to awarding damages under Section 74 of the Indian Contract Act, 1872 and do not mention Risk and Costs being claimed under a separate contractual clause and hence do not throw light on the issue whether Liquidated Damages and Risk and Costs may be claimed simultaneously.

The proposition of law that the aggrieved party is only entitled to a reasonable compensation which should not exceed the sum of penalty or pre-determined amount which has to be paid after the breach of the contract, may be held to be correct, if the relevant provision of the contract does not expressly or by necessary implication keep alive the right to claim damages under the general law, the right to claim the same may be necessarily excluded.

However, the above proposition may not hold good when the parties had specifically agreed to imposition of liquidated damages in the nature of penalties for a specific breach, viz, failure to meet specific milestone date and loss resulting therefrom.

In addition to the provision for Liquidated Damages, subject to the terms of the contract the aggrieved party may be well within his or her rights to recover risk and costs/ additional costs and expenses incurred for engaging third parties for carrying out balance work / supply of materials, etc with a view to avoid delay in contemplation and/or mitigate further delay.

Therefore, claiming of Liquidated Damages and Risk and Costs simultaneously is indeed a reality but would necessarily depend upon the terms and conditions of the contract which would essentially govern the right of the parties. But the mere existence of provision for Liquidated Damages in a contract which may provide for a maximum ceiling limit in terms of stipulated percentage of the contract value would per se not be a bar from recovering actual damages incurred under other heads.

In the aforesaid background, subject to the provisions of the contract, Liquidated Damages and Unliquidated Damages (including Risk and costs) both may be claimed for following reasons:

1. Liquidated Damages are penal/ compensatory in nature which is imposed on the Contractor for the delay and damage suffered by the Employer due to such delay in execution of the works under the contract. Additional costs/ Risk and costs on the other hand are in the nature of reimbursements claimed by the principal towards costs and expenses incurred for engaging third parties/ purchasing materials from third parties and includes additional costs incurred to avoid delay in contemplation and/ or mitigate further delay. Hence, Liquidated Damages is limited to the damages incurred generally due to delay (once the factum of delay has already occurred) and the other Unliquidated Damages including Risk and costs are wider in that sense as it generally relates to all costs and expenses incurred due to default to avoid delay in contemplation and/or mitigate further delay (the factum of delay may not have occurred and is being prevented). Moreover, this is further corroborated by the Supreme Court's holding in Steel Authority vs. Gupta Brothers that it may not be the intention of the party to recover for all types of breaches by way of a Liquidated Damages clause.
2. The Liquidated Damages component claimed for is under Section 74 in the nature of a penalty for breaching the contract by failing to meet milestones and the remaining component of unliquidated damages may be claimed for under Section 73 as loss suffered or damage caused by breach of contract i.e. direct costs of hiring third party/ purchasing materials which was the known natural consequence of default.
3. The Supreme Court in Steel Authority vs. Gupta Brothers, (2009) 10 SCC 63, has held that existence of a Liquidated Damages clause is not a bar to recovery of damages under other clauses under the contract. It is also noted by the courts in other judgments that reimbursements of payments made on behalf of the Contractor is separate from Liquidated Damages. Similarly, it has also been noted that there can be different remedies 'without prejudice to each other' under the contract for different breaches of the contract. Hence, in view of the foregoing it is fairly settled that there is no bar that once there is a Liquidated Damages clause in respect of a particular claim, damages cannot be awarded although they arise on account of another claim under the same contract.

CONCLUSION

It is a settled position of law that for interpreting a provision of a contract, the intention behind execution of the contract by the parties is sacrosanct and needs to be determined. If the parties to a contract, out of their own free will and volition agreed to concurrently apply different provisions of the contract within their ambit for dealing with different breaches, the provision for liquidated damages stipulating a maximum ceiling limit would be construed merely as one of the modes to recover damages for a specific breach only. Such a provision would not act as a bar in a case where the contract itself provides for and allows the affected party to claim damages under various other heads including – Risk and Costs/ Additional Costs in addition to and apart from the stipulated Liquidated Damages. Therefore, Liquidated Damages and Other Damages (Unliquidated) such as Risk and costs/ Additional Costs both can be claimed simultaneously and the ceiling on Liquidated Damages claim cannot be made applicable to claim of damages under other heads.
